Overview of School

Our School Community

Crescent Collegiate is a Grade 7 to Grade 12 School located in the community of Blaketown on Route 80 in Trinity Bay. Our school services a very large geographical area that extends from Chance Cove and Fair Haven on one end and extends to include Hearts Desire on the other. Our school's enrolment is 499 students. We have 282 students in high school (grades 10-12) and 217 students in junior high (grades 7-9).

To meet the educational and functional needs of the students, we had 36.25 full time teaching staff, 5 student assistants, 3 custodians and one full time and one part time secretary. Within our 36.25 teaching units, we have one full time and one part time guidance counselor to complement a special services department of 6.5 who offer support services to students. There is a 0.54 LRT teacher, a full time music teacher, art teacher, a full time technology education program along with 3.25 teaching units dedicated to the delivery of a Core French and Late French Immersion programs.

We have a range of services available to us through the Newfoundland and Labrador English School District. These services include speech language pathologists, educational psychologists, curriculum program specialists, and itinerant teachers for learning disabled, visually impaired and hearing impaired students.

Key Highlights/Special Projects

Our school offers English stream programming however, the Late French Immersion program starts for students in grade 7 and continues to graduation. Core French is also available in the high school course offerings. We had 79 students in High school Core

French representing 28% and another 21% in French Immersion for a total of 49%. In total, we offer 71 courses at the high school level including Advanced Mathematics and a complete Science program.

To support the efforts of our students, we offer the Tutoring for Tuition Program (TFT) and the Tutoring Work Experience (TWEP) Programs. In the TFT Program, high school students receive training and then tutor other students in Crescent and the feeder schools in areas as required. The tutors receive tuition vouchers for their efforts while providing a service that also serves to reinforce their own learning. The TWEP program is similar to the TFT program but uses former students presently attending post-secondary to provide tutoring services.

In addition to an extensive extra-curricular sports program, our school offers exceptional programs in Art, Music, and Theatre Arts. Crescent Collegiate Music Program had a great year as well. The Vocal Ensemble competed internationally in Orlando, Florida. They received Bronze place, and were awarded a call back to Carnegie Hall, New York! They also had countless performances at Remembrance Day, Christmas and Spring Concerts. The "Crescent Jazz" group performed at Volunteer Appreciation Day. Our Concert Choir has held over 100 students and won awards at the Kiwanis Music Festival.

Crescent Collegiate Sports program was extremely active this year. We boasted many wins with the volley ball, soccer, hockey, golf and softball teams. The wrestling program also saw some of their players make the Canada Team!

The lunch time ROV program gives students an opportunity to work on a remotely operated underwater vehicle during lunch. While students often build and design an ROV for regional competition at the Marine Institute, the program has also been successful at reaching out to male and female junior high students who would normally not get inside the skilled trades room until their fourth year. It also provides a place for likeminded students to meet and build constructive relationships as they themselves build something totally from scratch and apply many concepts learned in the classroom against a real world design problem.

The Drama Troupe competed once again in the regional contest, and won various awards there.

We have very active groups in our school – Allied Youth, Spirit Committee, Debate Team, Human Rights Groups, STAND (Students Teachers against Negligent Driving), Remote Operated Vehicle Team, Military Challenge Team, a Chess Team, and the Cardboard Boat Team.

Our school is extremely proud to announce that the graduation class of 2017 again participated in a Safe Grad to complement the formal graduation ceremonies. This was the tenth consecutive year now for the Safe Grad. It is especially gratifying to see the level of

graduate participation grow from 35% in its first year to 97% plus since its start. It is now the highlight of the "graduation" for the students.

Partnerships

Crescent Collegiate has developed many strong relationships within the community. We would not be where we are without them.

Student Awards and Recognition Program: Some 60 local businesses and organizations supported our annual Awards program this year. A total of \$13,000 was given to over 60 students in the form of various academic and extra-curricular awards. As well, the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 39 has funded three \$1000.00 scholarships – one for the academic program, one for the general program, and one for a family member of a Legionnaire. We have also secured a \$5000.00 Harwood Scholarship from a local business man – Keith Harwood.

Kids Eat Smart Foundation: Our School Council worked with the Kids Eat Smart Foundation, local businesses, and community volunteers (especially the Salvation Army) to maintain a Breakfast Club at our school. This past year, we spent over \$23,500. This program serves approximately 300 students five days a week.

Canadian Blood Services: We again hosted blood donor clinics at our school this year for students and the community at large. This program served to greatly enhance the social conscience of our students. In fact our students once again won the provincial title for most donations in the province. Our school was once again the provincial winners of Young Blood.

Royal Canadian Legion Branch 39: Mr. George Brown continued his efforts to promote remembrance amongst our youth and visited our school to promote the Remembrance Day Poetry, Essay and Poem Contests. They continued to support our Annual Student Awards Program. Mr. Brown, along with Mr. Brent Temple also involved us in the Regional Military Challenge.

Eastern Health: In addition to the standard services they provide, representatives from Community Health conducted various sessions with our grade 9 students around the theme of Healthy Decision Making, Healthy Relationships, Sexual Health and the Criminal Youth Justice system.

We are once again the proud partner with the Health Authority. Every 2 weeks we are host to a Student Wellness Clinic in which a nurse is stationed here for 2.5 hours a session. We have had tremendous positive feedback, with this and our Safe and Caring school goals.

RCMP: We boast a very strong relationship with the local RCMP Detachment in Whitbourne. They have been very supportive and are a member of our school council.

It was truly a very busy year for our students. These partnerships have complemented our school goals and are an integral part of developing a safe and caring atmosphere for our students.

Internal Assessment Data

Social Studies:

Overall, the results for Social Studies courses were strong. All junior high courses showed a very high pass rate and strong overall averages. Likewise, performance at the senior high level was also strong with 100% of students passing both Canadian Geography 1202 and Canadian History 1201. Student performance in World Geography 3200 and World Religion 3101 was a little weaker, however performance was just below the provincial averages. There was a strong pass rate in Newfoundland Studies 2205, however the overall student average was low. This is reflective of a high percentage of non-academic students enrolled in this course during the 2016-17 school year.

These results indicate that students generally perform well in all levels and types of social studies courses at Crescent Collegiate. This is re-enforced through the external public exam data from the same years.

The Social Studies Department will be focusing upon developing effective practices for extracting/interpreting/applying information from sources, during the 2017-18 school year as a means of improving student performance at all levels of social studies within the school.

Mathematics

Overall, Crescent Collegiate performance in the area of mathematics was strong. In senior high courses students scored above the province in pass rate and class average in Math 1202, 2202, 3202 and 2200. Students scored just below the provincial class average in Math 1201 and 2201. Students scored only slightly below the provincial pass rate in Math 1201, however in Math 2201 they scored 8% below.

In junior high, Crescent had a 90% or higher pass rate in both grade 7 & 9. There was however an 81% pass rate in grade 8.

These results point to continued growth within mathematics, notwithstanding the need to focus on the weaker results in grade 8 and Math 2201.

The Mathematics Department will continue its focus and emphasis upon improving student's skills and performance in this area during the 2017-18 school year. In particular, they will continue to emphasize an increased frequency of evaluations along with skill building initiatives in areas such as fractions and multiplication tables.

English

All senior high English courses showed a strong performance. The class average was above the provincial rate in English 1202 & 3202 and only slightly below in English 1201, 2201 and 2202. Also, the pass rate for each of these courses was at or only slightly below the provincial statistic.

In junior high, the percentage of students passing each course was at 90% or above in all three grade levels, ranging from a high of 97% in grade 7 and 91% in grade 8. The overall average for each course is a respectable high of 71% in grade 7 to 64% in grade 8 and 68% in grade 9.

The English Department will be striving to continue to improve grammatical skills through the use of grammar/comprehension booklets in grade 7 -9, general English courses in high school along with Writing 2203. They also plan to continue to develop student skills in writing, representing and speaking skills at all levels using a variety of teaching methods (i.e. Write Traits). They also plan, where possible, to integrate technology to enhance assessment for learning, along with varied assessment strategies (i.e. literacy files).

Science

All senior high science courses performed well. In each case students performed above, at or only slightly below the provincial statistics in terms of pass rate and class average.

In junior high, students obtained a 100% pass rate in both grade 7 and 9 with the grade 8 class succeeding at 96%.

In both instances student achievement was strong in the area of science.

During the 2017-18 school year, the Science Department will be continuing to promote scientific literacy throughout the junior and senior high curriculum through enrichment activities, lab use, science activities (i.e. science fair) and through the use of STSE connections.

French

At the senior high level, students scored above or at the provincial level in both pass rate and class average in Francais 1202 & 2202, and French 2200 and 3200. The only course that was slightly below the provincial average was French 1200. This statistic was offset by a high rate of participation in this course at our school, with both academic and general stream students completing this course in high numbers.

The junior high pass rates were all strong with students in grade 7 & 9 Francais and 7 & 9 Core French passing at the 100% rate. The grade 8 rate for both was 96%. This was supplemented by a strong class average throughout.

The French Department will be focusing on basic skills such as grammar, writing connections, dictionary use, independent learning, reading comprehension and listening. They plan to also implement increased use of minor assessments into their methodology.
