#### **Message from Principal**

I am delighted to present our School Development Report for the 2016 – 2017 school year. This report gives us an opportunity to share with our parents, guardians, and other interested parties our students' academic achievements and challenges and it also provides us with an opportunity to update our school community on the progress we have made with our School Development Plan. We have just completed year 5 of our 5 year School Development Plan. Our focus continues to be on developing our students' literacy and numeracy skills within the 21st Century Learning Skills and providing a safe and caring environment in which to learn and grow.

The infusion of technology and 21<sup>st</sup> Century learning skills that enhance literacy and numeracy continues to be a major focus at our school. We have concentrated our efforts on developing our English Language Arts and Math programs building capacity amongst our teachers. Last year we had 4 teachers working with the Literacy Numeracy Program, these four teachers continued their work this year and we dedicated substitute time to allow the teaching partners of the cohort teacher to join them and the Literacy Numeracy Teacher in the planning and reflection sessions. Teachers in all grade levels have moved into the Literacy/Numeracy Block Structures for teaching; all teachers are at different stages of implementation, they are all well on their way.

This year, our staff completed the Inclusive education training with Cordell Osmond. Staff reviewed our school development plan to ensure that we were genuinely inclusive in our actions and language. We continued our Digital Citizenship Plan for our school and each class participated in the NLESD digital citizen lessons. We have had a very successful relaunch of our School Wide Positive Behavioural Supports program. At St. Francis of Assisi we are Falcons and we SOAR (Safe, Organized, Accountable, Respectful).

- St. Francis of Assisi School is a true community school. Our partners have worked diligently to help provide the best educational opportunities for our students. We have a very dedicated group of volunteers who serve on our school council, coach many sport teams, organize our bi–annual auction, read to our kindergarten students, and support various special events and fieldtrips throughout the year. 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#### **Our School Community**

St. Francis of Assisi Elementary is located at 29 Outer Cove Road in the Town of Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove. It is a Kindergarten to Grade 6 English stream school with an enrolment of 225 students. The school is wheelchair accessible with an average class size of 20.

Our school had a total of 13 full-time and 6 part-time educational staff, which included 12 classroom teachers and 3.97 Instructional Resource teachers. We had the services of a guidance counselor (.40), music specialist (.61), band specialist (.16), physical education teacher (.61), and Learning Resource teacher (.20). We had 1.25 units for administration and 6 student assistant positions. In addition to school based staff we had access to District staff, including an educational psychologist, a speech/language pathologist, Deaf and hard of Hearing Itinerant, Visual Itinerant, and program specialists.

## **Key Highlights/Special Projects**

#### Home-School Reading Program

This year all of our K-2 students, along with their families and teachers, participated in the Home-School Reading Program. Each child kept a daily log of every reading encounter and recorded it in his/her personal booklet. The students, teachers and families exceeded the target of 30,000 reading encounters for the year. Reading celebrations were held during the year and the Radical Readers Club was established.

#### Accelerated Reader Program

Our students in grades 3-6 participated in the Accelerated Reader Program. The AR reading program gives students access to over 30,000 titles. The AR program also allows parents

to follow their child's reading progress and to receive an email reporting their child's progress on their reading quiz. Students read approximately of 8 - 10 books per year.

#### **Mathematics**

Each year our elementary students participate in the Mathematica Continuum contests. We also participate in various math events like 100<sup>th</sup> day throughout the school year to promote mathematics.

#### **Band Program**

All students in grade 5 & 6 can participate in the band program. We have a 0.16 band teacher who comes to our school one morning and one afternoon during the 7 day cycle. Students perform in various school activities throughout the year.

#### Basketball Program

The basketball program is organized by parent volunteers and is open to students from grades kindergarten to grade six. The focus of the program is to teach basketball skills and good sportsmanship. Also various grade level teams participate in basketball tournaments throughout the city.

*Cross-Country Running and Baseball* are among other extracurricular activities available at the school. We had over 120 students participate in Cross Country Running, Track and Field and Baseball.

# **Community Partnerships**

#### The Town of Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove

We have forged a strong community partnership with the Town of Logy Bay - Middle Cove - Outer Cove over the years. A member of the town council acts as the school liaison between the school and town. The town council has provided tremendous support to the school Annual School Development Report

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in various ways. We also partner with the town in a recycling program. The town allows us to use their shed as a drop off site for our recycling program. Money from this program goes to support various school initiatives. This strong community partnership has allowed us to provide the best educational opportunities for our students. Our grade 6 students participated in Municipal Day with our town and attended a town meeting with our Mayor, John Kennedy.

Our town has been a strong supporter of our recreation and fitness programs and sponsored a full recreation event. Mayor Kennedy and the Recreation co-ordinator for the town, Janet Roff came to our school and played a basketball game with all of our elementary students! The students won with a buzzer beater basket!

#### The Terry Fox Walk/Run

Each year for the past ten years, St. Francis of Assisi has formed a partnership with the local branch of the Terry Fox Foundation to continue to support the dream of Terry Fox to raise funds for cancer research. In September, the entire school community participated in a walk around our town. This initiative creates tremendous school spirit, encourages physical activity, helps students to remember the legacy of this amazing Canadian, and raises funds for cancer research.

#### Community Partnerships

Parents, local businesses, and other business people in the community give tremendous support to the school. They support our bi- annual auction and other various programs and initiatives like our Christmas Sharing, Foster Child, Iris Kirby House, Food hampers, Terry Fox Walk etc. Their support allows St. Francis of Assisi to provide the best educational opportunities to our students and to make us a true community school.

#### D.A.R.E.

Drug Awareness Resistance Education is a program provided to our grade 6 students by the Royal Newfoundland Constabulary in partnership with the school. The program provides our students with knowledge and skills to make wise choices as they meet various challenges in their lives.

#### Roots of Empathy

This year we were fortunate to have two Roots of Empathy instructors partner with our school; Heidi Keating, Guidance, and Janette Kelly, Principal. Roots of Empathy is an evidence-based classroom program that has shown significant effect in reducing levels of aggression and bullying among school children while raising social/emotional competence and increasing empathy. Both grade 3 classes participated in this program and we were so pleased to partner with our ROE families and their babies.

#### School Auction, Dinner, and Dance

This year we held our biannual school auction and dinner. We showcased class art and community businesses donated auction items. This year, we expanded our event to include a dance. The event was a massive success! Thank you to all of our families and businesses that helped out. Monies raised will go toward new technology and associated educational apps and computer programs, in-class and take-home reading materials for every classroom, resources to support Student Support Services programming, support of our safe and caring schools initiatives such as Positive Behavioural Supports and wellness, new musical instruments, and more STEM related equipment, such as science kits for each class.

- On average, 100% of our grade three children were at or above grade level expectations on Mathematics indicators
- On average, 84% of our grade four children were at or above grade level expectations on English Language Arts indicators;
- On average, 84% of our grade four children were at or above grade level expectations on Mathematics indicators
- On average, 90% of our grade five children were at or above grade level expectations on English Language Arts indicators;
- On average, 100% of our grade five children were at or above grade level expectations on Mathematics indicators
- On average, 95% of our grade six children were at or above grade level expectations on English Language Arts indicators;
- On average, 95% of our grade six children were at or above grade level expectations on Mathematics indicators

#### What do these results tell us?

Overall, our students are achieving well in English Language Arts and Mathematics. As a staff we collaborated about students who were considered at risk or having difficulty and an individual plan was put in place and monitored for these students. When reviewing data from Terms 1-3, students made progress in English Language Arts and Mathematics between each term and interventions were successful. All students identified made gains and it was noted that students using the Leveled Literacy Intervention program made gains in reading (decoding, comprehension, and fluency).
