Overview of School

Our School Community

St. Catherine's Academy is located in St. Catherine's, St. Mary's Bay. We serve the communities of Admiral's Beach, O'Donnell's, St. Joseph's, New Bridge, Forest Field, St. Catherine's, Mount Carmel, Mitchell's Brook, Harricott, Colinet, North Harbour, Deer Park and Salmonier Line. St. Catherine's Academy opened in 1993, following the amalgamation of schools on the north and south sides of Salmonier Arm. We have a current population base of 73 projected for the 2018-19 school year. Our homeroom configurations are as follows: Kindergarten to Grade 3, Grades 4-6, Grades7-9, Level I/II and Level III. This year, we do not have any students enrolled in Grade 8. We offer a single stream English program with all courses required for students to successfully complete a High School Diploma. We also offer numerous senior high school courses via CDLI (Centre for Distance Learning and Innovation). Secretarial, maintenance and custodial services are provided, as well as district itinerant services, where needed.

Key Highlights/Special Projects

Learning Commons

During the 2017-18 school year we began a project to transform our Library into a true learning commons. The reconfiguration of this space included new furniture, the addition of technology in the form of computer stations and a team board and various centers.

Breakfast Club

We are very proud of our Breakfast Program at St. Catherine's. Through this program, we provide a nutritious breakfast to all students every school day. This program continues to be very successful, thanks to our staff volunteers and generous donors. We also use this program as an opportunity to educate our children about the importance of proper nutrition and the long term benefits of a healthy diet. We host special days, such as fruit and vegetable days, when we highlight the benefits of such foods. Funding for this program is provided through Kids Eat Smart.

Thanksgiving Personal Care Product Drive / Operation Christmas Tree

In our efforts to encourage empathy in our school community, each year our students collect personal care products during the Thanksgiving season to donate to groups/ agencies who care for those in need. Each Christmas, the Student Leadership Team collects non-perishable food items and prepares Christmas hampers for needy families within our school community.

Partnerships

At St. Catherine's Academy, we value the importance and benefits of building partnerships. Over the past few years, we have actively promoted the establishment of partnerships and once again, this year, we are reaping many benefits from our partnerships. Our current partnerships include:

What do these results tell us?

The number of students experiencing difficulty with English Language Arts in K-6 remains a concern. We are observing those students closely and are implementing academic interventions based on their individual needs. Through team teaching and IRT support, we will also implement class-wide interventions where necessary. We are hopeful that the addition of the support of a Reading Specialist will make a significant difference to this trend. The school development plan for 2018-2019 includes objectives and strategies specific to improving reading comprehension.

Through observation and analysis, it is evident that for our students who experience difficulties in Mathematics, we can often directly relate the issue to their literacy skills.

Our School Development Plan continues to be centered on improving student achievement in a safe and caring and socially just learning environment. While our data is evidence that most of our students are performing well academically, we need to continue to reach those who are not realizing their maximum potential in this regard. Likewise, we need to ensure that we are challenging those students who are meeting grade level expectations in achieving their fullest potential. Essentially, we need to be cognizant that meeting grade level expectation is not enough, as most students' ability is much greater than this identified standard. We will also continue to focus on providing opportunities for our students to continue to develop into socially aware citizens.

Actions for Change 1.1: While there were great strides made in the area of Literacy Blocks, as a staff we need to be consistent in the delivery of the blocks. Reading comprehension remains to be an area of concern. We hope to make more progress in this area with the addition of a Reading Specialist to our staff and the use of targeted interventions.	Actions for Change 1.2: A periodic review of the policies is needed to keep students on track. It is also essential that all staff consistently follow the policy. The tutoring program is still underutilized even with a concerted effort to encourage students to avail of the tutoring for tuition program. While the location of our school may be a factor, we must continue to promote the value of this program both to possible tutors and those in need of tutoring.	Actions for Change 1.3: While we are very proud of how far we have come in the area of assistive technology, it will remain an area of focus. Even with all of the exposure to assistive technology, some students remain resistant to using it, preferring to have a teacher read or scribe for them. More effort is required to promote the benefits of using technology to these students. As well, we have to explore the use of more up to date technology.
