Our School Community

Leo Burke Academy is a grade 7-level IV school serving the community of Bishop's Falls, NL. As of April 15, 2019, the enrollment was 182 students in the following grade levels:

Our grades are single stream but in high school we offer the general, academic and advanced streams.

During the 2018-2019 school year, LBA employed 13.75 teaching units, which includes 1.25 administration time and 0.50 guidance. We also have one student assistant, two custodians, and one administrative assistant.

Also providing services to our students is a Speech-Language Pathologist, school nurse and an Educational Psychologist who is based in our school.

LBA also offers a variety of courses through CDLI, including Math 2200, Math 3200, World History 3201, Physics 2204 and Physics 3204. Next year we are planning to expand our programming through CDLI by offering Art 3200 and Computer Science.
