#### What do these results tell us?

Course grades and pass rates generally correlate well with provincial grades and pass rates. Unfortunately, in some situations, average course grades and pass rates are negatively skewed due to a single student's very poor performance. Very small class numbers make this possible without the removal of outliers. Summarizing internal data analysis reinforces our belief that poor attendance likely contributes to lower grades; hence, attempting to address this through our recently adopted school attendance policy is a high priority.
