What are the next steps?

Continue and Deepen Current Initiatives:

Goal: Continue growing programs that have shown strong student and staff engagement.

- Student Focus Groups
 - Move from informal feedback to structured cycles that include reflection, action, and review.
 - Consider offering leadership credit or recognitions for regular contributors.
- Murals and Visual Culture
 - o Plan seasonal or thematic murals co-designed by students to align with various events.
- Clubs & Co-Curriculars
 - Use survey data to identify gaps in interest groups (e.g., environmental activism, writing, coding, etc.).
 - o Offer club mentorship opportunities from staff/community experts.

Communication:

Goal: Improve home-school communication and transparency.

- Determine the idea frequency and assign responsibility to streamline contributions from staff.
- Include student voices (quotes, work samples), spotlights on clubs, teams, classroom projects, multilingual welcome messages and calendar updates.
- Format for accessibility (e.g., mobile-friendly, PDF, and email versions).

Community Safety Initiative:

Goal: Proactively address safety concerns and support student wellness.

- Partner with law enforcement for:
 - o Grade-specific safety sessions (e.g., digital literacy, vaping awareness, etc).
 - Parent information nights with space for Q&A.
- Co-develop a Safe Spaces school campaign.

Data-Informed Review of Belonging & Engagement:

Goal: Monitor and improve school climate over time.

- Use PMF data and student survey scales (e.g., sense of belonging, engagement, teacher-student relationships).
- Add one or two internal surveys during the year to check in with the student body.
- Use the data to adjust programming (e.g., target support to grades or cohorts feeling disconnected).

School Culture:

Goal: To improve and promote positive school culture.

- Merch Mondays
 - o Promote school identity by encouraging students and staff to wear school-branded clothing every Monday.
 - o Partner with local businesses to offer student-designed apparel.
 - o Have options and opportunities for gently used clothing to be upcycled.
- Wellness Wednesdays
 - Continue building on current practices by rotating themes:
 - Mental health awareness:
 - Outdoor classroom activities;
 - Staff shout outs and gratitude walls;
 - Lunch-and-learns or mindfulness breaks.

Multicultural Representation:

Goal: Expand visibility, understanding, and celebration of all student identities.

- Multicultural Fair Expansion
 - o Include guest speakers and storytellers from local communities.
 - o Include more student performances, food sampling, and cultural workshops.
 - Cross-curricular tie-ins.
 - Create and promote a Multicultural Calendar of observances with student co-leads responsible for sharing messages and leading activities.

Community Garden - Phase 2:

Goal: Transform the garden into an inclusive, cross-curricular outdoor classroom.

- Add raised and regular garden beds.
- Ensure wheelchair accessibility through paved or firm-surface paths.
- Install multilingual signage (student-created, representing school languages).
- Connect to science, wellness, and home economics curriculum.
- Invite more community gardens (e.g., seniors, conservation groups) for planting days or workshops.

Possible Shift of Focus for the 2025/2026 School Year:

Macdonald Drive Junior High has recently been in the media spotlight, and not always in a positive way. We recognize the importance of acknowledging these concerns—every student and family deserves to feel heard. At the same time, we have a responsibility to ensure that all members of our school community feel confident and comfortable in the school environment. As we look ahead to a new school year, we remain committed to the strength of our school community and to our long-standing focus on creating a positive, safe space for everyone at MDJH. Our positives outweigh greatly the challenges faced this 2024-25 school year.
